First Reading: Acts 4:8-12

Peter explains to the elders that his healing of a cripple was done in the name of Jesus Christ. He reminds the elders that they crucified Jesus, but God rose him up so that all people could be saved in his name.

Second Reading: I John 3:1-2

John expresses amazement at the fact that God allowed us to be called his children. Although we are unsure exactly what we will be after this life, we do know that we will see God as he is and be like him.

Gospel: John 10:11-18

Jesus speaks of a shepherd working only for pay, with no real concern for the sheep being well cared for. But Jesus is our shepherd and would lay down his own life for all those in his flock. God loves him for his willingness to sacrifice himself for the sake of all God's children.

FLOCKNOTE is very simple. Text the letters **SienaML** to the 5-digit phone number **84576**. Make sure your autocorrect on your phone does not mistakenly change the text. Once you send that in, *FLOCKNOTE* will send you back a confirmation message and a verification code with a link to enter the code. That's it! From the Desk of Fr. Jared

Throughout the Easter Season, all fifty days until Pentecost, we read about many of the post-resurrection appearances of Jesus. The gospels in their entirety are composed of little stories that can stand alone. In scriptural terms we call them *pericopes*. My favorite post-resurrection pericope is from St. Luke's gospel. It is the story of the disciples on the road to Emmaus (Luke 24: 13-35) on the first Easter Sunday evening. Today's gospel immediately follows that story. The road to Emmaus story is highly relatable to our experience. The two disciples, one called Cleopas and the other unnamed, are highly emotional. They have just been through a week of turmoil. In the beginning of the week, they experienced great joy and pride as Jesus made his triumphal entry into Jerusalem. Then, everything changed. They experienced fear, confusion, shock, disappointment, abandonment, anger, and sadness. Who has not felt such emotions? It is precisely in these moments where we, like the disciples, can have an encounter with the risen Lord. He comes to us each week in the Scripture proclaimed and in Eucharist, just like on the road to Emmaus.

Emmaus places some important questions before us, as individuals and as a faith community. How is Jesus alive and present among us? Do we burn with love for him? Are our own hearts gradually on fire within us when the Scriptures are opened to us? When have we taken the road back to Emmaus, preferring to remain in the familiar, among what is known and calculable, rather than move forward to the unknown challenges of new life? When have we experienced that strange and wonderful feeling of "the burning heart" as we listened to the Word of God at the Eucharist or in private prayer? I hope these questions focus our prayer during these weeks of Easter.
